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Virgo Virginum is a adapted from a movement of Stabat Mater, which was commissioned by Haderslev Domkirkes Pigekor (Haderslev Cathedral Girls Choir) and conductor Mr Thomas Berg-Juul

Composer's note

In my original *Stabat Mater*, this movement is musically one of the more hopeful movements, but using the same text for a stand-alone version did not feel right. While searching for a new text, I was very excited to find that there is a mirror image to the *Stabat Mater dolorosa* called *Stabat Mater speciosa*. Here, Mother Mary is not in pain by the Cross, but in joy at the birth of her Son. Both texts are from the 13th century and are often attributed to the same author (Jacopone da Todi), but the true author is not confirmed. The *Stabat Mater speciosa* has the exact same structure as its more famous sibling and even many of the same words. By using this text for the standalone movement, this piece would work very well around Christmas or before Easter.

Kim André Arnesen



Arnesen is one of the most frequently performed composers from Norway today. He grew up in Trondheim where he was a chorister in the Nidaros Cathedral Boys' Choir, later being educated at the Music Conservatory in Trondheim. With an interest in baroque music, contemporary classical music, and popular music, Kim could have taken many roads, but choral music became his greatest passion. As a composer, he had his first performance at the age of 18 with the boys' choir. Since then he has written music that has been performed and recorded by choirs all over the world. In 2015–16, Kim was Composer-in-residence for the Denver-based choral ensemble Kantorei and Artistic Director Joel Rinsema. The residency concluded with the recording of Kim's second CD album released in early 2018 on Naxos Records. He continues to enjoy a busy international schedule of commissions.
